# Spread the <br> Word

## Reflection by Greg Sunter

The gospel writer presents this episode as a deliberate attempt by the Pharisees to trap Jesus and turn the people against him. Their plan was a good one, with no apparent 'safe' answer: is it permissible (within Jewish tradition) to pay taxes to Caesar or not? If Jesus were to answer that it is not permissible to pay taxes then he would be identified as a rebel and a threat to Roman authority - leaving himself open to severe punishment. If he were to answer that it was permissible to pay the taxes he would have alienated a lot of his audience who resented the taxes imposed by Rome. Instead of falling into the trap set by the Pharisees, Jesus approaches the question
 in a completely different way. He asks them to show him the money with which they pay the tax. Immediately, he has turned the tables on them. He doesn't appear to carry any of the coin in question and yet the Pharisees' disciples carry them as a matter of habit. They are asking if it is permissible to pay the tax and yet freely carry the coin with which the tax is paid. Jesus shows up the hypocrisy of their question by forcing them to reveal their own position in the simple action of producing one of the Roman coins. Jesus then closes the dispute by instructing them to render (give) to Caesar what belongs to Caesar but, more importantly, render to God what belongs to God. In a very simple way Jesus has shown up the Pharisees' disciples as being collaborators with the Roman authority and placing that authority above the authority of God. He reminds the listeners that regardless of earthly authority, the first duty is owed to God.

## Maintenance Update <br> Church Skylights

The removal of the Perspex in the Church Skylights has been completed.
With the removal of the Perspex, there is currently no diffuser to reduce the amount of light and glare coming through the Skylights. This is particularly noticeable with the harsh afternoon sun. Please note that when the entire roof is replaced, in the near future, the plan is to include diffusers on the Skylights. For the time being, just take into consideration where you sit in the Church. Particularly for early morning and evening Masses.

## Removal of the Leopard Wood Trees

The Leopard Wood Trees located to the left of the Church, behind the Statue of Our Lady, will be removed over the coming months. Two trees will be removed on Tuesday 24 October. This has come about for a number of reasons including:

- The seed pods causing a safety hazard when laying on the concrete. We have had a few parishioners with near misses of slipping
- The leaves are causing regular clearing of the gutters, which is an expensive cost each time.
- The roots of the trees have caused damage to the wall and pathway below the location.
Please note that we will be replacing the Leopard Wood Trees with mature Waterhousea Trees, which are more suitable. An example of these Waterhousea Trees are on the corner of the Dominic Centre near the OSHC entrance.

## STATEMENT ON THE VOTE

Now that the referendum result is known, it's time to look forward rather than look back. There will be a time for looking back, but a cooling off period may be needed if we are to see more clearly. Now is the time to ask not how we got here but where this result leaves us as a nation, where we need to go from here and how we might get there.

One thing is clear: the nation is more divided than ever and in many ways. It's ironic that a process supposed to unite the nation has done just the opposite. There's an urgent need now to create a new kind of national unity, and that can't be left to the politicians, because there's more to this than politics. The task belongs to all of us.

A second thing is still clearer and more urgent: the search for reconciliation based on truth and justice must continue, even if the referendum process and result have made that more difficult. This too is something that can't be left to the politicians, because again there's more to it than politics.

After this result at Federal level, the focus will have to move to the States. But it will also have to move to non-government organisations like the Churches. The Australian Catholic bishops have spoken of the need for a new engagement with Indigenous peoples, and that now becomes more pressing. In the Archdiocese of Brisbane we will commit ourselves more resolutely to our Reconciliation Action Plan and keep asking what else we can do. Fine words and symbolic gestures are not enough.

The process leading to this vote has been a highly politicised slog that has changed Australia, and not for the better. Now the real work begins. It's up to all of us to ensure that what we do from here serves national unity and racial justice, because we'll never have the first unless we have the second.
